This year marks 80 years since

the 1937 Purple Victory that took place in Palmer Auditorium. Although Montevallo and the tradition of College Night have changed much throughout the years, the foundation for the event that we all know and love today is easily seen. The Purple leader was

Aeolian McRee. The assistant leader was Emily McLendon. At that time, each side had a leader, an assistant leader, and com-



mittee chairmen. These committees resembled the cabinet system that is in place today. Rather than a full theater musical production. each side was tasked with presenting several components: a stunt, slow impersonasong, tion, pep song, special music, and

a toast. The stunts and impersonations were written by the students and represent the most theatrical aspects of College Night at that time.

In 1937, the Purple Side's stunt was titled, "Maddening Melody." The main character, Paddycowski, is a "sentimental musician," who has been battling with writer's block as he tries to compose a new song. Relief from this struggle finally comes in the form of a nightmare, in which the elements for his rhapsody are finally revealed to him. For the impersonation, the Purple Side presented "The Story of Noam." It was adapted from Arabian Nights, which is the English title given to a collection of Middle Eastern and South Asian folk tales and stories. In this adaptation by Marjorie Walton and Helen Austin, Noam is stolen from her husband to be presented as a gift to the Prince of the Faithful in Damascus. Her husband, Neameh, proceeds to the city of her imprisonment in the hopes of finding his lost love. Unfortunately, the outcome of Neameh's quest is unclear from the program but one can only hope that he is reunited once more with Noam.
